IS J-TREE FOR ME? YA BETCHA!

J-Tree Thanksgiving has become at least a semihallowed tradition for the AMC, and for good reason!

It combines disparate but pleasurable elements — wearing your fingertips bloody doing 5-7s to 5-12s on sharp granite, attiring oneself in cheerful plaid raiment, gorging oneself to a state of comatose torpor, leading climbs that test your ability, telling lies around the campfire, following on routes that stretch your ability, flaunting your culinary competence, chugging up toproped "standards" to enhance your skills, earning stars in your crown by feeding the hungry, and having a great time unless you are terminally out-of-it.

Some may show up at the Indian Cove groupsite #1 as early as the evening of November 22nd, driving the five hours straight from work. The main crew will arrive noonish on the 23rd some not until Friday. Both 29 Palms and the town of Joshua Tree are about 15-20 minutes drive from camp if you need a meal, motel or shower. Yucca Valley is not much farther and offers more variety.

To get there, go toward Los Angeles on I-10 passing through Blythe and Desert Center. Then watch for the Joshua Tree Cottonwood entrance. Drive about one hour north through the park – past White Tank and Belle Campgrounds and the main park entrance, go right at the "T" -- to 29 Palms. Then go west on Hwy 62. The turnoff to Indian Cove from Hwy 62 is west of 29 Palms.

The campground is primitive which means no electrical hookups or water within miles. If you can get some, bring firewood for the evenings. Space is limited to carpooling is highly desirable. Days will *probably* be sunny and warm and nights will certainly be chilly. Nothing is certain this time of year, however, so be prepared for anything including rain and high winds.

Usually from 40 to 60 AMCers attend at least a day or two over the long weekend. So far the weekend is shaping up as a BYOL outing (bring your own leader). However, some leaders are susceptible to flattery or threats and can be counted on to rig some topropes for the leaderless. There are numerous guidebooks available in Phoenix shops and it is an excellent idea to own one that covers the correct portion of J-Tree. There must be 4,000 routes in the park listed in at least a half-dozen guidebooks.

In addition to your normal camp chow and gear, be sure and bring eatments for the pot-luck on Thursday evening. Call Elizabeth at 602-241-6681 for suggestions and to indicate what you plan to bring. She also needs non-food items such as tables, lanterns, wash water, etc. Call her or e-mail elassuy deudoramail.com.

Many climbs afford real "bumper belays", and the climbing walls are *all around* you. But that is just one of the lures of a J-Tree Thanksgiving!

The south rim of Grand Canyon National Park near Mather Point and the village is cleaner today, thanks to the efforts of volunteers from the AMC, Southern AZ Rescue Association, and Central Az Mountain Rescue Association. The AMC's 68 volunteers bravely went where few others have gone before — over the side of the canyon to pick up litter.

The cleanup operation, led by Gary Youngblood at Mather Point and Tim Medlock at the Grand Canyon Village, was a good time for all. Working in teams of two, we set anchors and sent one person over the edge while the other stayed on top to keep the tourists away from the anchors and answer questions. I think the most common question was "How far down do they go?" I should have said "To the river", but I found

myself giving honest answers instead.

It was disappointing to see all the trash below the rim when we first arrived, but the wind gusts quickly demonstrated that at least some of the trash gets there by accident. At least one person had to go over the edge to get his own coffee cup! We made a huge visual improvement, picking up frisbees, hats, cups, water bottles, etc. and had fun the whole time. The wooden snake that was recovered by one team somehow found its way to a ledge so that another team could discover it on their way up. THAT got someone's attention!

Besides having fun, we almost got celebrity status by the tourists. They were pretty impressed with what we were doing. I observed several tourists taking video footage of the people picking up trash over the edge - where else are trash picker-uppers get treated with such reverence? Several people I talked to expressed sincere appreciation to us for doing what we

The Mather Point crew got the treat of being out on a prominent lookout point and picking up coins from all over the world, but the Village crew (a.k.a the Village People) got a different kind of treat. We were lucky to be able to observe a California Condor hanging out on a ledge near Bright Angel Lodge. There were apparently four of them in the area, all raised in captivity and released near Vermilion Cliffs a few years ago. It was a real blessing to see such a rare bird. It was HUGE.

After a long day of beautifying the Grand Canyon, we all met at Shoshone Point for a spectacular sunset and dinner. Thanks to all the volunteers and organizers who make this event possible!



ANCHORS AND ADVANCED ROPEWORK SCHOOL -- AARS

This course is the next step for Basic School grads and will teach you to safely set anchors for toproping. We will not cover lead climbing anchors in this class.

First session: Learn anchor components, anchor types, knots, hitches.

Second session: Learn basic anchor setups and characteristics.

Third session: You will test yourself in nine "hands-on" anchor scenarios.

Fourth session: We will cover some self-rescue techniques.

(The slings are the only àdditional equipment

needed over the Basic

School requirements)

Students will be required to wear a helmet during the Saturday session. We have helmets available if you do not have one.

This class is designed to teach you how to set anchors for your own climbing experience. In order to become independent and set your own anchors, you should start acquiring anchor gear. These purchases will be limited by how much money you want Vhave to spend and how much interest you have in climbing independently. The following gear is not required for the anchors class, but if you have some, you will be able to practice setting it in a controlled, learning environment during the class. All of the gear recommended below can be used for the lead class, and none of it will be wasted if you intend to set your own anchors. All gear should be marked prior to bringing it to class to prevent confusion between it and other people's gear. If you don't know how to mark gear, check with an instructor before doing so to avoid weakening equipment due to improper marking.

OTHER GEAR that you may want to bring to anchors class:

1 partial set of hexes, about sizes 4-10, already slung

1 partial set of stoppers, about sized 4-10

any other pro you may have (camming devices, Tri-cams, etc)

extra biners (regular D's, ovals, and lockers -- stay away from specialty biners at this time)

extra slings (perhaps four 5', two each of 15', 20' slings, untied lengths)

BITS AND ODDMENTS


