

Minutes of the AMC Board Meeting:

Through a miscommunication, AMC had two simultaneous board meetings on Nov. 1st in two separate locations, neither of which had a quorum. The next board meeting will be at 7 p.m. on Wednesday, December 1st, at 115 W. McDowell, Suite 1.

'Nother Dang Election

But this one should be less acrimonious, the claims mostly truthful, the ideology a lot less divisive, with kinder press attacks, gentler slurs and innuendos and with genuine affection for the helpful intent of all candidates. AMC will need to select new officers and board members at its January meeting.

Actually, two will be carryovers for another year — Wayne Schroeter and Scott Hoffman. Presumably our current president, Bruce McHenry, will fill an automatic board slot to help assure continuity unless he is drafted for a third term. But that still leaves two board positions up for grabs. The officers are de-facto board members, of course.

If you are interested in serving as a board member or officer, the man to see is Elections Chair Dave Van Hook. All officer positions are open to challenge, including President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer. A ballot will be printed listing the candidates for each position.

The board has "job descriptions" for all officer slots and most committee head positions. Call the Secretary for this information. Members can run for office after one year's membership in AMC.

Read the Friends of Queen Creek report of recent activities and plans on page 9. Since that meeting a news story confirms the seriousness of the threat to Queen Creek as a world class climbing area. I take it as a bad sign that Governor Napolitano flew to Britain to drum up tourism for Arizona and to secure British financing of \$1 billion to develop a copper ore body east of Superior. Az. And here is a recap of some of the information printed last month, for your convenience.

To get to Joshua Tree National Park, go toward Los Angeles on I-10 passing through Blythe and Desert Center. Watch for the Joshua Tree Cottonwood entrance (exit marker 168). There is a \$10 entrance fee for a seven-day pass for a vehicle. Drive about one hour north through the park to a 'T' intersection to 29 Palms. Go left (west) on Highway 62 through 29 Palmsto the tyurnoff to Indian Cove, left or south of Hwy 62. If you reach the

town of Joshua Tree without taking the Indian Cove road you have gone too far.

If you arrive Tuesday you will have to make a camping reservation at 1-800-365-CAMP. AMC has four sites in the Indian Cove group from noon Wednesday through Sunday a.m. However, only 26 cars will be permitted there, an unfortunate fact strictly enforced by the USNPS. Each site will have an AMC sign-up list and the allowed number of permits — so get there early. Car Pooling is good.

In the event of truly miserable weather (which has happened) there are motels and restaurants within close driving distance. But normally the weather is beautifully warm during the days and qquite cool at night.

For added information, check into the local website http://:www.friendsofljosh.org. The local shops sell numerous guidebooks, but be sure the one you get covers the area nou need.

Crying Dino Grad Climb

The end of the recent Basic School saw another successful grad climb of the Crying Dinosaur in the Superstitions. Five students and four instructors enjoyed the bushwhack approach, wandering route and fun rappels. The opening move continues to mystify most people, myself included, and Bruce learned the hard way that cams placed in cracks worn smooth by 30 years of hand jams don't always hold.

We talked about efficiency before we started the climb, but we ended up taking more time than we usually do. It didn't matter too much: we were safe, we had fun, and we got back to the cars just as it turned dark. It certainly beats rappelling and thrashing downhill in the dark.

President Bruce led the climb, so he can now check it off his list. In fact, he basically ran the outing: he picked up and dropped off gear, led the pitches, and set up the rappels. We cut away the rat's nest of sling on the three bolts at the top of the second rappel. The creativity of the previous anchor-setter was to be commended, but we felt better building a new anchor where we could actually see what was going on.

Friends of Queen Creek Update - November 2004

The Friends of Queen Creek were formed to help preserve full public access, for climbers, hikers, birders and & everyone, to the Queen Creek area, just east of Superior. This area is defined roughly as Queen Creek Canyon, the Oak Flat campground, and the area between Devils Canyon and the Apache Leap. These lands are threatened by proposed copper mining methods that would close the area to the public forever.

Several activities to support the Friends of Queen Creek incorporation as a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization occurred recently. This status will allow us to engage in some lobbying and other political activities to protect Queen Creek access. Curt Shannon, Clay Vollmer, Paul Dief and Connie and Ted Gartner will be directors. A bank account will be opened soon. A very snappy, professionally developed, full color, trifold brochure goes to print this week. We expect to receive some financial proceeds from a recently applied for, Access Fund grant.

We are providing information about Queen Creek to Lori Faeth, who serves as Governor Napolitanos Natural Resources Director. We are investigating

claims that a well-known out-of-state climber was hired to locate alternative climbing areas within 1 hour of Phoenix. More later. We are investigating allegations that recent mining claims have been made within the federally protected Oak Flat Campground area.

In addition to an upcoming letter-writing campaign, we have several other activities that need to get done. The Friends of Queen Creek Steering Committee is small. We cannot do all the things that need to be done. We need responsible folks, who can participate in small projects and regular tasks. We need special expertise in computer graphics and web design.

Initially, the Friends of Queen Creek Volunteers will have their first meeting December 2nd at 7PM and on the first Thursday of the month thereafter. Queen Creek climbing area access issue Climb it? Or mine it?



Recreational access to the Queen Creek climbing area is being threatened by a copper mine that has been proposed by the Resolution Copper Company.

Resolution Copper is trying to take over Oak Flat campground via a congressionally legislated land swap, which in turn would threaten access to all these areas: Queen Creek Canyon, Apache Leap, Devils Canyon, Hackberry Canyon, etc.

We need your help to keep this world-class climbing area (and home of the Phoenix BoulderBlast) from disappearing forever into a big hole in the ground. Join the Friends of Queen Creek!




Service with a smile!

Secondly, I would like to create a database of Arizona climbers and the mountains they have climbed. It is amazing what cumulatively you all have done in so many parts of the world.

The purpose for the effort is to provide the database for AZ climbers so that they can share information, maybe find fellow climbers of similar interests etc. Mountaineering ranges from CO 14'ers to the larger ranges of the world. We have folks who are participating in mountaineering at a variety of levels and often ask me for information on climbs, who else does their type of climbing, etc. And we have a cumulative wealth of information amongst us. If you will fill in the rows of information (one for each mountain climbed, or at least your favorites) and return the spreadsheet to me, I will cut and paste your rows of information into the primary database I will maintain You must email me to get the blank Excel spreadsheet. That will be the only format I will accept. I won't have the time or energy to enter data you present in any other format (no matter how much I may like you!)

Please consider participating. A few minutes of entering your resume willreally help get this project off the ground.

Looking Up for Alpine Rock — The Fab 7 in SW Colorado

For those of you who would like a larger scale and challenge to your climbing efforts than afforded by Arizona sling shot rock set-ups, you might consider putting your climbing shoes into your pack, grabbing your rack, lacing up your boots, and heading up into the hills a little higher.

Alpine rock climbing usually means ascending a mountain via a technical route using rock climbing gear, and maybe a little ice and snow techniques as well.

Chances are that you'll encounter Adventure at its purest and find yourself dealing with odd things for a central AZ climber: uncertainty, route finding, loose rock, weather, and...commitment.

Here is a list of pretty easily accessible alpine rock climbs in Southwestern Colorado. I've done them all and can highly recommend each (and please forget the CO 14'ers -- they're boring compared to these -- and I've done all of them too.)

For guidebooks use Robert Rosebrough's The San Juan Mountains, and then check out the two references therein to my father's climbs and finds back in the early 50's.

Lizard Head (13,113 ft), South Dihedral --Located above Lizard Head Pass on the way to Telluride, this 5.8 alpine rock spire is an old volcanic plug. Dan

Bolin and I did it in 3 roped pitches with some scrambling in between. Very loose. Some say it is the toughest summit to reach in CO. About a 3 hour approach mainly on a good trail.

Dallas Peak (13,809), Regular route -- The hardest of the top 100 peaks in CO. Approach from Telluride and try to find the route. A party from the Colorado Mountain Club couldn't the day Susan and I climbed it in a hail storm. I was told by the CMC leader that my 4 pitch route probably went at 5.8. A similar rating was given by a local guide. I think it was easier, but then I was wearing my Makalus... We backpacked about 2 hours into a wonderful, albeit rainy, campsite under the South Face. A must do.

Teakettle (13,819) Regular route -- A fun climb with a sting in the tail just east of Sneffels. One, maybe two, technical pitches right at the top, depending on snow. It's climbed from Yankee Boy Basin. I did with Susan years ago. Just a good day out...

Vestal (13,864), Wham Ridge, and Arrow Peak (13,803), North Ridge -- A long backpack into Vestal Basin from the narrow gauge train between Durango and Silverton. The Wham Ridge is a classic 5.5 or so, depending on line, and the long, long, long, North Ridge of Arrow is a Covington classic going at 5.7. Susan and I ran up both on back to back days. Almost a perfect long weekend from Phoenix heat.

North Face Couloir on Gilpin (13,694) -- rock and ice. You will NOT find this in any guidebook, but it is Clay Patton's favorite climb. I did with Susan and Mark Hubble several years back. It is total commitment. Simply no "pro." Just stacks of loose rock. You climb up and out. Mid-5th class, but a nice 18 inch ice ribbon. Good candidate for a "solo" climb so you don't catch any flying fussilages, and maybe safest that way. Belays are crap anyway. Take two tools.

North Face of North Twilight Peak (13,075). It's the massive mountain viewed from the Durango Ski Mountain. Climb from the beautiful Andrews Lake parking lot. Backpack into the base. Lots of easy to mid-5th class rock lines on the expansive North Face. Maja Kotarska and I did most of the Directissima, but in very high avalanche hazard. Wait until the snow goes...but what a beautiful line and mountain. To heck with taller ones when you can do this...

North Buttress on Sneffels (14,150). Now this is a "classic." Donna Gaudet and I did in a whole bunch of pitches and a long, long day. Sweet. Depending on line from 5.5 to 5.8. You will be committed on this route! Backpack in from a trailhead out of Ridgeway. Three hours puts you into Blaine Basin, heaven on earth. Then a mile of maybe meadow and increasingly steep snow. It's the prominent rock left of the Snake Couloir.

So, when do you leave?
