

Forty two enthusiastic students and probably that many instructors have made it through another AMC Basic Climbing Class. The weather proved to be one of our biggest challenges for this class – reminiscent of the Spring 2003 class.

On our Thursday night session at the park, we had a heavy rain and had to practice belaying and rappelling under the shelter of the ramadas. Every roof had leaks, but it was better than being out in the steady rain. I had a couple dozen wet ropes to dry out on Friday, ugh!

Students were excited an anxious to get out on the rock Saturday, but Mother Nature had other plans. Heavy rain all night on Friday and into Saturday morning caused us to postpone the Saturday session until Sunday. There were a lot of disappointed folks on Saturday morning when we cancelled the class.

Sunday, the weather was good, and everyone got a chance to practice on short problems and do some short rappels. We encountered 3 rattlesnakes, who were also out enjoying the wonderful weather. Two of them found a nice resting spot right under someone's backpack while we were over on the dome practicing rappels. With a long stick and some gentle encouragement, we got both of them to relocate – but they let us know they weren't too excited about moving.

The Tuesday and Thursday prusik sessions were held at the Solid Rock Gym, on the north side of town. Everyone seemed to enjoy learning how to ascend ropes and get past obstacles using prusiks – when you think about it, it's pretty slick stuff to know. I've used those self-rescue techniques several times and can vouch for how handy they are!

We held the Sunday session the following Saturday out at Lost Bandana Wall. It was really hot, but not quite as bad as last fall's class. Students had a blast, learning how to get their weight over their feet and walking up walls that looked awfully vertical. We had climbs ranging from nice and easy, to pretty challenging – something for everyone. We saw a snake on the way out – so remember be careful out there this time of year!

The grad party was held Saturday night, since we had Marilyn's house reserved for it already. It was easier to leave it 'as is' then to try to reschedule after all the grad climbs. Thanks for hosting the party MG!

Grad climbs were all rescheduled, miraculously accommodating the schedules and climb preference of almost every student, thanks to the outing leaders and instructors who were willing to do that. The day after the grad party, Wayne Schroeter took a group to the Pancake House, Jef Sloat took a group to the Hand, and Scott Hoffman took a group to Jacuzzi Spires. The next weekend, Rogil took a group to the Hand on Saturday, Tim Lange and Tim Ward took a group as part of the Queen Creek Cleanup, and Dave and I took a group to the Hand on Sunday. Another outing to Jacuzzi Spires was led by John Keedy on April 3, and the final group went up the Monk with Jeff Hatfield on April 10.

Whew, it's good to have it all over with and get the harnesses and helmets stowed away until the October class. Not all the survey forms are in yet, but preliminary feedback indicates that the students learned more than they expected to and that our class is the best value in town! Special thanks to all the instructors who helped with the class – I REALLY appreciate it, and I know the students do too.



## Epics on Olive Oil - Red Rocks, Las Vegas, NV

Olive Oil is a classic 5.7 six pitch climb located in Juniper Canyon on Rose Tower.

6:30 AM at the trailhead, as we knew others would be seeking our route. We arrived minutes behind the 1st very unfriendly party of two from the northeast, enough said.

As we were racked and ready to go another party of two showed up. Off we went. David Paul and I swung leads for the route and Sheri Kenly climbed 3rd. Some exposed face climbing moves on the first pitch then up about 80 feet to an alcove for the belay. David Paul was off on the second pitch lead and I on belay when I heard a young man's voice: "Do you mind if we climb through?" I looked quite sternly at this young man who had little gear, no water and no shirt on. I said sure fella, climb on but stay away from my leader's rope...! I was a bit tiffed, as I had never been climbed through before. A few seconds later another buff young man appeared, pulling in slack through his belay device. He introduced himself as Josh. He said thanks for letting my partner Paul and I climb through as we are trying to set a speed record today. Now that made more sense. Sheri and I felt like, these guys do know what they are doing. We let Josh know the mean party ahead was really going to love them...be prepared. We wished him well.

The second pitch: beautiful climbing with exposure. Met David at the belay anchor, picked up some gear, and then I was off for the 3rd pitch lead. I was to traverse out. I did but this beautiful dihedral was calling my name, come cam me... so I did. I heard a rope length call, I responded, I saw the anchors ahead, ok. I reached the anchor all right—it was made with trad gear, oops! Off route! The dihedral had lured others as well. I brought David and Sheri up to meet me. I added an oval to the anchor, rappelled out, found the route and set up a new belay. David and Sheri followed on rappel.

I then led up a short section to the bomber belay bolts for the famous 6th pitch lead. David Paul had his name on it. By now there were a total of five of us at the 5th belay ledge/rock top. I met a fellow Texan, while on rappel as he was leading, and recommended he not go the way I went. He thanked me as he said that dihedral looked good to him, too. Tex and friend led off for the 6th pitch, we heard the leader yell down this is scary dude...! We all looked at each other with big eyes, as we were next!

David starts his lead, as he steps up and starts the

very exposed traverse over to the Dihedral. The Dihedral crack is now very shallow requiring that you go up about ten feet before you place your first pro. Now you are looking at a 15-foot chinney off width that pros well and is great climbing. Be prepared for a very wiggy about-face award move approximately 12 feet up. Atta boy David! Again during this lead another party began climbing the route. Cleaning the 6th pitch was a trip, gear and ropes everywhere. The second party even clipped our pro!

Finally we were on top of Rose Tower...! Magnificent views. We were all quite pleased with our veture.

There were a total of 5 parties on Olive Oil that day. Later in the evening at the Red Rocks Rendezvous we learned that Paul Addison and Josh Thompson set the speed record for the climb at 1 hour 29 minutes car to car. That was not the only record Paul set that fine day in March, but that is another story...! March 19th, 2004—a record day at Red Rocks.

Apparently the buzzing was too disconcerting for them.

It seems that the nickname *Buzz Lightyear* had been bestowed on a certain outing leader during a previous Basic School. #### **Proposed By-Law Change**

The Board is proposing a Bylaw change that will eliminate the requirement that the Classification Chair be an Outing Leader, thus allowing for more options in filling the position. The change is also intended to ensure input from all parties that have a part in the responsibility for preparing and approving individuals to be Outing Leaders.

#### The current Bylaw creating the Classification Committee reads as follows:

5. Committees.

a. The following committees, whose existence and duration shall be perpetual, shall be estab lished and maintained by the Board:

i. An Elections Committee to con duct the annual elections. The Elections Committee may propose to the Board rules pertaining to elections, consistent with these Bylaws, which, upon board approval, shall become a part of the Standing Rules.

ii. A Classification Committee, the chair of which shall be approved to lead outings, to establish and maintain standards for Members who may be approved to lead outings, and to advise the Board of those Members who satisfy such standards. The Classification Committee may propose rules pertaining to its charge, consistent with these Bylaws, which, upon Board ap proval, shall become a part of the Standing Rules.

#### We propose to change it to read (changes underlined):

5. Committees.

a. The following committees, whose existence and duration shall be perpetual, shall be establ ished and maintained by the Board:

i. An Elections Committee to con duct the annual elections. The Elections Committee may propose to the Board rules pertaining to elections, consistent with these Bylaws, which, upon board approval, shall become a part of the Standing Rules.

ii. A Classification <u>Committee to es</u> <u>tablish</u> and maintain standards for Members who may be approved to lead outings, and to advise the Board of those Members who satisfy such standards. <u>The Classification</u> <u>Committee shall consist of a Classification</u> Chair and such members as the Board shall define by a Standing Rule to help the Clas sification Chair make his or her recommen dations to the Board. The Classification Committee may propose rules pertaining to its charge, consistent with these Bylaws, which, upon Board approval, shall become a part of the Standing Rules.

This Bylaw change proposal will be presented to the membership at the April member meeting. If approved, the Board will consider the following proposed Standing Rule at the next Board meeting:

"The Classification Committee shall consist of a Classification Chair, the Activity Chair, one or more Officers or Directors, one or more Outing Leaders. and one or more members of the Training and Schools Committee."

## Queen Creek Access Issues...

The following is information is from Sierra Club Bulletin - Palo Verde Group — sent in by climberchick.

Recreational access to the Queen Creek climbing area is being threatened by the proposed Resolution Copper Mine. Resolution Copper claims their mine will be underground, but they are not addressing the issue of loss of access that will caused by their mining footprint, nor are they addressing a host of other issues such as surface subsidence that will be caused by the particular method of cave block mining that they are currently planning to use, or hydrological impacts to the nearby Devils Canyon canyoneering area.

A coalition of groups called "Friends of Queen Creek" is forming to ensure that recreational access will continue at Queen Creek. Paul Diefenderfer of the Phoenix Rock Gym has been designated as spokesperson.
