

Queen Creek climbing area access issue Climb it? Or mine it?



Recreational access to the Queen Creek climbing area is being threatened by a copper mine that has been proposed by the Resolution Copper Company.

Resolution Copper is trying to take over Oak Flat campground via a congressionally legislated land swap, which in turn would threaten access to all these areas: Queen Creek Canyon, Apache Leap, Devils Canyon, Hackberry Canyon, etc.

We need your help to keep this world-class climbing area (and home of the Phoenix BoulderBlast) from disappearing forever into a big hole in the ground. Join the Friends of Queen Creek!

We are not opposed to mining. But we are FOR ACCESS! We need to make Resolution Copper develop their mine in such a way as to preserve recreational access to these public lands.

Friends of Queen Creek update - February 2005

The Friends of Queen Creek hosted a meeting of the Access Fund in Phoenix during the last weekend of February. The public meeting and gear raffle/ fundraiser was held at the Phoenix Rock Gym.

Mining experts Dave Chambers and Jim Kuypers have been engaged by the Access fund to develop independent mining and economic studies of the proposed copper mine in the Queen Creek area. We expect that many more jobs for Arizona will be created if the proposed mine is developed as "stope and fill"or "room and pillar" than using the "block cave" method proposed. Only the block cave method will cause surface subsidence requiring permanent closure of the surface to the public.

It is reasonably likely that Arizona Senator John Kyl will introduce a bill into the US Senate in March authorizing a congressional land swap which will give the mining company unrestricted surface and subsurface rights to the Oak Flat Campground area. Please write Senator Kyl to express your opinion opposing this land swap.

The AMC is pleased to offer a Glacier Travel and Crevasse Rescue Class April 27, 30, and May 1. It is intended to provide a good introduction to modes of travel on snow, as well as offer the basics needed to travel safely on glaciers and perform crevasse rescues. The class will cover ice ax usage, crampons, selfarrest, roped travel, snow anchors, belays, and rope techniques for crevasse rescue. This class is a good one new students entertaining ideas for climbs like Rainier, or as a refresher for returning students.

The evening session will be held on April 27 at 6:30 p.m., at a location to be determined and announced when you sign up. The weekend session will occur on the 30th and 1st. Crevasses will be simulated!

Participants will be asked to provide their own personal equipment, e.g., warm clothing, cramponcompatible boots, ice ax, crampons, harnesses, and prussiks. Crampons and ice axes can be rented from the AMC. A complete list of suggested personal gear will be provided when you sign up.

We will provide group climbing gear, e.g., pickets, flukes, ropes, and the like.

It is highly recommended that all participants must have completed AMC Basic School and the Anchors class (or equivalent with permission of the instructor) and be a current AMC member.

The class size will be limited, so sign up early. The cost for New students will be \$75 and the cost for Returning students will be \$25. Full payment from those signed up will be due on April 12. Refunds will only be offered after that time if a substitute can be found.

Basic Rock Climbing School

Arizona Mountaineering Club

Spring 2005

The Arizona Mountaineering Club (AMC) has been teaching basic rock climbing for over 35 years. We place maximum emphasis on safety and self-rescue. This is a beginning climbing class. We will teach you equipment care and usage, rope handling, climbing knots, belaying, rappelling, climbing techniques, and self-rescue. Enroll-ment fills up quickly, so don't delay; make a reservation to join us soon!

Class schedule (this is 2-week class):

*North Mountain Park is located at Peoria and 7^{th} St, 5 miles north of Camelback on 7^{th} St. Turn west into the park and look for the orange traffic cones imprinted "AMC" at Havasupai Ramada.

Experience required: None. Even if you have never climbed a tree before, this class is for you. What is provided by the AMC:

- Technical climbing gear that will be used for the school (and is yours to keep): 1 belay/rappel device, 2 non-locking carabiners, 3 locking carabiners, 4 prusiks, one 5' sling (subject to change)
- Harness and helmet provided free by the AMC for the duration of the class if needed
- Basic climbing textbook
- Instruction through all phases of the class
- Discounts from local retailers on climbing gear

Equipment recommended for the class: You will wear a climbing harness at every class, so dress casually. Most sessions will be held outside, so watch the weather. Climbing shoes are recommended for the weekend sessions only. The AMC rents climbing shoes on a first-come, first-serve basis on the second night of class for \$10 for the class. We will discuss what to look for in a shoe on the first night of class.

Paperwork: You will be required to read, fill out and sign an AMC release of liability on the first night of class. Students under 18 must have the release signed by their parent or guardian (no students under 14 please; students 14-15 years of age must be accompanied by an older adult).

Class fee: \$160 plus membership if not already a member (\$25 for an individual and \$30 for a family). Membership is good through Dec., 2005.

Registration: The class is limited to 40 students. To reserve a spot, send a check for \$160 + membership cost (see Class Fee above) made out to AMC Basic School. Include your clearly printed name, address and current phone number(s). Mail to: AMC Basic School, 1025 E. Highland Ave., #26, Phoenix, AZ 85014. No credit cards accepted.
