# Minutes of the AMC Board Meeting March 14. 2005

Members Present: Jutta Ulrich, John Keedy, Clay Volmer, Jeff Nagel, Bruce McHenry, Scott Hoffman, Wayne Schroeter, and Robert England

Meeting called to order by Jutta Ulrich at 7 PM with quorum present.

Minutes of February Board Meeting reviewed, amended, and passed as amended for publication in the April newsletter.

Treasurer's Report reviewed and amended to move T&S Capital Equipment expense from Total Capital Expenditures to Equipment under Total Training. Motion carried to approve as amended.

President's Updates: Jutta addressed briefly items for goals and priorities and tabled the items for later discussion in order to spend more time on outing leader issues.

#### Committee Reports:

- 1. Wayne distributed classification policy (inclusive of last three policies) and clarified the classification committee policy evolution. John led discussion on how to address outing leader certification for candidates whose application and development spanned the changes in certification policies and procedures. John made motion to use the old process and forms (May 2003) to complete Robert England's outing leader certification process. Motion carried to approve. Wayne will communicate with Nancy Birdwell to resend the May 2003 outing leader approval forms ico Robert England to the outing leaders for approval.
- 2. Motion carried to approve Mike Knarzer as a multi-pitch outing leader.
- 3. Land Advocacy: Clay presented discussion regarding the use of the AMC member database to send targeted emails (2 times) on behalf of the Friends of Queen Creek. Bruce noted the AMC's prior position is to not allow such use or release of member information to outside organizations. Mo-

tion made and carried to forward FOQC message soliciting support through normal AMC channels. Bruce will forward such messages with an introductory statement and write an article for the next newsletter that explains the situation.

- 4. Newsletter: Wayne will help Wally with writing and formatting as needed.
- 5. The Queen Creek Cleanup is scheduled for April 2, 2005.
- Programs: Sheri has requested general assistance with program arrangements. Jeff Nagel will contact Sheri for details and lend assistance.

#### Old business:

- The Pueblo Grande Facility will likely not be available for the April and May monthly meetings. Bruce is researching an alternate.
- Outing Leaders: Bruce made general recognition of those who held recent outings and suggested additional recognition be made for those who help with newsletter processing at the monthly meetings.

  - a. Motion made and carried to fund in full (tuition) Robert England to attend an AMGA approved Top Rope Site Manager Course.
  - b. Robert presented an idea to develop a database of outing leader experience/ accomplishments for general membership access. No action from brief discussion.



# April program Come see Randy Leavitt

One of the world's most accomplished climbers

Randy has been rock climbing for 30 years, and was the first person to climb El Capitan (Excalibur) and BASE jump off as a means of descent. He and Tony Yaniro developed the off-width technique known as Leavittation. Among his other accomplishments are 5.14 sport and trad first ascents, first ascents and first solo ascents on El Cap, and the first ascent of Stratosfear on the Painted Wall, Black Canyon of the Gunnison, Colorado. Randy has established hundreds of new routes in California, Nevada, Arizona and Utah, and was a member of the 1986 Gasherbrum 1V Expedition.



#### **President's Corner**

Today's topic is money. The Board has been discussing various issues regarding club outings and outing leaders (OLs) for a long time now. We are actually getting closer to resolving some, hurrah! One specific issue was expenses that the OL incurs when taking out a group. This could include gas for the car, a permit for a state/national park, possibly costs for camping, and so forth. With input from quite a few OLs, the Board recently decided (once again) that financial incentives and reimbursements are not effective. So the AMC is not paying for the membership fees, for gas or mileage for the outing leaders.

Having said that, let's recall that our outing leaders are volunteering their time and their expertise when they organize outings. They do this because they like to share, like to teach, and like to climb. Those of us who participate in the outings usually have a very good time, so let's not forget to thank the OL afterwards and to help pay any group expenses, such as gas. If you ride with your OL or any other group member, please remember to make a fair contribution to

gas, perhaps even a little more. The roads to some climbs take a toll, and it's expensive to maintain a vehicle. Don't forget that the gas tank has to be refilled one more time upon arriving back in town, and when you divide the costs, divide by the number of passengers. Don't make the driver/car owner pay for her/his portion of the gas; she/he is, after all, bringing and driving the car.

For the last 10 years as an AMC member, I have always (!) been a passenger. I have not always paid my share, but have recently tried to do better. Please help in supporting drivers and outing leaders, chip in, bring refreshments, offer constructive feedback and a thank you.

# **Outing Leader Training**

We are looking for more Outing Leaders in the club. If you have taken and helped with Anchors School, and are interested in becoming an OL, please contact me at <a href="wayne@iWayne.com">wayne@iWayne.com</a> for more info. The training we are conducting will prepare you to take other people out. We ask only that you commit to becoming an OL and to taking three outings a year for three years. We are hoping that you will help pass on these skills to future Outing Leaders as well. After that, use these techniques to take your friends and family out.

I have scheduled two Outing Leader Training sessions, one for April-May and one for May-June. These sessions will be two weekends in length. The two weekends will be independent, so that you could take Weekend #1 in one session and Weekend #2 in another session. Also, you could start on either session.

The curriculum will include a discussion of OL responsibilities, an expanded self-rescue seminar and advanced anchors work, with work on both bottom and top belays. These particular sessions are geared toward top-rope outings, but I will also take any participant as time permits and teach you multi-pitch skills used by professional guides to help prepare you for your next step.

The first session is scheduled for the weekends of April 30-May 1 and May 14-15. I have not determined the dates yet for the second session. I already have some people signed up, but can take more.

This training will not qualify you as an Outing Leader. You must still go through our Outing Leader selection process and be peer-reviewed by current Outing Leaders before being approved by the Board.

All current Outing Leaders and Board members are also invited to attend. This will show you many techniques being taught by professional guides.

## **AMC Glacier Travel and Rescue**

Sign Up for the AMC Glacier Travel and Crevasse Rescue Class

The AMC is pleased to offer a Glacier Travel and Crevasse Rescue Class April 27, 30, and May 1. It is intended to provide a good introduction to modes of travel on snow, as well as offer the basics needed to travel safely on glaciers and perform crevasse rescues. The class will cover ice ax usage, crampons, self-arrest, roped travel, snow anchors, belays, and rope techniques for crevasse rescue. This class is a good one new students entertaining ideas for climbs like Rainier, or as a refresher for returning students.

The evening session will be held on April 27 at 6:30 p.m., at a location to be determined and announced when you sign up. The weekend session will occur on the 30th and 1st. Crevasses will be simulated!

Participants will be asked to provide their own personal equipment, e.g., warm clothing, crampon-compatible boots, ice ax, crampons, harnesses, and prussiks. Crampons and ice axes can be rented from the AMC. A complete list of suggested personal gear will be provided when you sign up.

We will provide group climbing gear, e.g., pickets, flukes, ropes, and the like.

It is highly recommended that all participants must have completed AMC Basic School and the Anchors class (or equivalent with permission of the instructor) and be a current AMC member.

The class size will be limited, so sign up early. The cost for New students will be \$75 and the cost for Returning students will be \$25. Full payment from those signed up will be due on April 12. Refunds will only be offered after that time if a substitute can be found.

# Ice Climbing

I'm just back from a great trip to CO with Maria Stoianova, Tom Conner and Monica Miller, ice jocks all.

Fortunately the backcountry avalanche conditions were way down from the warning immediately after the early January snows (Moderate with pockets of Considerable). However, the local stories that abounded and the visuals of recent slides were astonishing. A slide down Second Gully had filled in that streambed almost up to the road—a vertical depth of probably 100 feet deep of debris. Bill Leo said Coal Bank Hill had slid all the way across and the snow at the restroom was 20 feet deep. I didn't see it, but wouldn't be surprised.

We climbed one day at Ouray (head to New Funteer or South Park—in the School Room you needed waders to get to the bottom of the climbs due to wall to wall stream flow).

Saturday we hit Second Gully bright and early with 3 degrees Fahrenheit. We had to break trail most of the way to the climb, with seemingly being the first party up that part of the canyon. Some tracks headed off to Whorehouse. One set made toward Stairway. It hadn't snowed in a while, so the Ice Festival and avalanche issues had kept the visitorship down.

I've lead Second Gully probably half a dozen times and climbed it a couple of others, but this was the hardest version I've experienced. It was very cold and the ice was quite brittle. It was formed pretty steep and sustained. No real snow parts; almost all continuous ice. Moreover, the water melt had flowed over top of the large snowfall, so the standard condition for most of the route was 1 or 2 inches of water ice over several inches of snow.

In placing tools the ice tended to shatter and/or send fissure cracks in all directions. When I could tell the difference, I developed the habit of kicking extra hard to get to the ice underneath the initial ice/snow.

Ice screws all too frequently bit for the two inches and then spun into the snow. Usually in the past I could tell where these patches were, but they were pretty widespread and even on almost vertical sections. I had to forego or replace about half my ice screw attempts.

I lead on two ropes, bringing up Maria and Tom simultaneously, and then while Maria belayed me on the next pitch Tom brought up Monica. We ran on without any rope hassles, so everyone played their part and made it work very, very well. Minimal wasted time for anyone. Maximum movement. It was damn cold all day and we needed the exercise to stay warm!

I had to dig out the belay trees I knew were down there somewhere, so all belays, except one, were aided by dwarf spruce. The other was a somewhat hanging belay above the second pitch, right at that damn spot where the cliff on the right would spray an avalanche right through me.

We climbed it in 3.25 pitches to the top and then rapped the route, tying off to trees for each rappel, rather than do the untread walk-off. It was the right decision.

We left the car at about 7:30 a.m. and returned about 3:30 p.m. I don't really see how it could have been done any faster, except if the ice conditions would have been easier.

Good team. Good results. Even the snowshoeing at Lizard Head (A neat peak Dan and I had done a year ago) Pass was remarkable for its perfect conditions.

Now that's a weekend!

#### The Club and Social Networks

A whole bunch of years ago when downhill skiing was my winter-time passion (now it's mainly ice climbing), I bumped into someone I had known in the Alpine Ski Club. When I first arrived in Phoenix in 1978 I was single, a Professor at ASU, and had the world on a string. I dated around, and found that two ski clubs in the valley (the Alpine Ski Club and the Phoenix Ski Club) offered me some social outlets and dating opportunities in conjunction with the fun of skiing.

This guy from the Alpine Ski Club asked me a question that absolutely floored me. He queried, quite sincerely, "Why don't you take trips with the Club anymore? I was floored. The question almost didn't make any sense to me. I don't recall what I responded, but the shocking absence of sense in his question hangs with me.

You see, in the intervening year(s) since I had been active in the Club and seeing him again, I had been married to a wonderful woman with three fine kids, all skiers. We traveled the Western United Stated skiing at least 5 or 6 times a year. My needs for skiing companions were fulfilled and I had not need for "the Club."

It was also more than that. My skiing vistas now included most of North America and I seldom visited the Arizona ski hills where the Alpine Ski buses ran. Maybe I had outgrown "the Club", or at least there was no need for me to be part of it in order for me to fulfill my desires. I didn't look to the Clubs for ongoing social fulfillment. Identity, etc.

Social psychologists have used the terms "Local social networks" and "Cosmopolitan social networks" to describe a frequently noticed distinction among types of social groups. While there have been many articles and books written on the subject, suffice it to say that individuals tend to be one or the other in their social participation and groups often can be dichotomized according to their predominant orientation.

Local networks are characterized by strong attachments, strong group identity with an inward view, highly emotional relationships, and high social connectivity wherein most friends are also likely cofriends with other members. Knowledge is handed down from those in the group tagged with that role (the Shaman). Norms are strong and enforced by peer

pressure. Ostracization is the ultimate means of social control. Personalities and relationships dictate who should be listened to. Social support is high. A marker is that it is almost considered mandatory to attend the funeral of a group member, even if you did not really like the person.

On the other hand, the cosmopolitan social orientation is characterized by loose and broad connections. "Friends" are more like acquaintances, and the cosmopolitan person tends to have many friends in many different situations. They tend to "network" and have lines of communication with individuals in power in many different settings. Cosmopolitan networks look to rules and standards for gauging interpersonal and group behavior. Interaction and group give and take are more contractual. The view is often outward. At their funerals, folks either do not come, or they come to be seen and network with the other people of worth who may show up.

It is not really a question of which type is better. The question might be, which type is better for what purpose? It turns out that Local networks do not always do as well at responding to rapid innovation - their strong interpersonal relationships get in the way. On the other hand, cosmopolitan network members have to provide for themselves in case of negative circumstances - they are somewhat alone except for what they can afford to handle themselves.

Can this social analysis be applied to the AMC? I suspect that the AMC as a Social Club is going through an adaptive period where the Local network model has been challenged, but remains pretty vibrant within the inner core of active participants in certain activities who maintain the Local sociality. The inflow of Cosmopolitan members, as perhaps fitting the changing climbing scene and the demographic pattern of the Phoenix metroplex, will likely continue. They will come through the doors and leave after their needs are met - but what they will tend to leave behind is a rich matrix of progressive ideas, challenges and opportunities.

In my opinion, this is all for the good. The AMC will likely shine as a Big House of many persuasions. We may understand the undertones if we look to the different perspective of the person next to us, albeit some looking inward and some looking outward.

The AMC Climbing Anchors School teaches participants how to set climbing anchors for top-roping. This course is the logical next step for AMC Basic Climbing School graduates.

#### Class curriculum:

Tuesday: Learn anchor components, anchor types, knots and hitches.

Thursday: Learn anchor system characteristics and construction.

Saturday: Gain experience setting anchors by practicing "hands-on" scenarios.

Sunday: Apply newly learned skills setting real anchors on an optional climbing day.

**Experience required:** AMC Basic School graduate or equivalent, which must include knowledge of how to belay, rappel, prusik, tie a figure-8-on-a-bight and figure-8-on-a-follow-through, and make a girth hitch.

Cost: \$75 plus membership if not already a member (\$25 for an individual and \$30 for a family). Membership is good through Dec. 2005. Register by sending a check payable to AMC Anchors School to 1654 W. Boston St, Chandler, AZ, 85224. No credit cards accepted. The registration fee is fully refundable if you cancel. #### Equipment required for the class:

- 2 non-locking "D" or oval carabiners (at least 2, bring more if you have them)
- 3 locking carabiners (at least 3, one of which should be a parabiner)
- 1 rappel/belay device (Trango Jaws, Black Diamond ATC, Trango Pyramid, Figure-8, etc.)
- 1 climbing harness
- 1 ea 4', 6', 10' 6mm prusiks (untied length)
- 2 ea 5', 10', 20' slings (1" tubular webbing, untied length, AKA runners)
- 1 or 2 personal anchor slings (commercial daisy chains or 4' sewn Spectra runners or equivalent)
- helmet-required for Saturday and Sunday sessions, helmets are available if you do not have one.
- 1 20' cordelette (a 20-foot length of 7mm accessory cord)

(The slings, harness and cordelette are the only additional equipment needed over the Basic School requirements) This class is designed to teach you how to set top-rope anchors. In order to become independent and set your own anchors, you should start acquiring anchor gear. These purchases will be limited by how much money you want/ have to spend and how much interest you have in climbing independently. The following gear is not required for Anchors School, but if you have some, you will be able to practice setting it in class. All of the gear recommended below can be used for Lead School, and none of it will be wasted if you intend to set your own anchors. All gear should be marked prior to bringing it to class to prevent confusion between it and other people's gear. If you don't know how to mark gear, check with an instructor before doing so to avoid weakening equipment due to improper marking.
