AMC Board Meeting Minutes - April 13, 2009

Board members present: Robert England, Eric Evans, Erik Filsinger, John Keedy, Jodie Bostrom, Kim McClintic, Bill Fallon, Danny Gonzales

I. Call to order. Robert England, V.P., called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

II. Minutes: The minutes of the March 2, 2009 Board meeting were approved as submitted.

III. Treasurers Report: Jodie Bostrom presented the Treasurers Report. The Treasurers Report was approved as submitted.

IV. Committee Reports

Membership: Currently there are 241 up to date and paid members.

Programs: There was a discussion of upcoming programs. Grant Loper is serving as Acting Programs Chair and may wish for assistance.

Land Advocacy: Erik Filsinger discussed Scottsdale's approval by the McDowell Sonoran Preserve Commission of the North Access Area Rock Climbing Plan which will keep all of the historic rock climbing crags in that area open to climbing. He presented a draft of a Grant Application to the Access Fund for trail signage to assist in directing rock climbers onto the appropriate trails.

Training and Safety: Bill Fallon discussed the AMC rock climbing classes. Technical Outdoor Climbing class went well, although there were two incidents reported where minor injuries were involved. Incident reports were completed and submitted.

Outings: Robert England discussed plans for the 45th AMC Anniversary activities on April 25 at Queen Creek.

Website: Robert England summarized the status of the website redesign and shared examples.

Old Business:

Documents on the website. Continuing a discussion of inconsistencies between the official club policies in hardcopy and electronic form held by the President and Secretary versus the documents on the website, Erik Filsinger proposed a working group chaired by himself and Grant Loper, John Keedy, Eric Evans and Robert England to tackle the task of gathering the most current policies and updating the website to reflect the official version. The Board approved this working group.

Policy Amendment Erik Filsinger proposed an amendment to the club policies that discussed maintenance of club documents. It was seconded and approved by the Board. It was also noted that it may need to be revisited after the working group completes its work. The new Board policy number X reads:

Maintaining AMC Documents (eff. 09-17-2005, draft amended April 13, 2009)

- A. AMC official documents include the current Articles of Incorporation, Bylaws, AMC policies, newsletters, insurance policies, minutes of the Board meetings, copies of the monthly treasurer's reports, and other Club legal documents, as well as amendments to same.
- B. The President and the Secretary of the Club will maintain paper copies of all AMC official documents in separate but parallel annual notebooks of the official documents of the Club.
- C. At the end of the year, the Secretary's copy of the notebook will be placed in the library.
- D. The President's copy will be retained through his or her term and handed on to the incoming President after his or her term.
- E. All current Articles of Incorporation, Bylaws and AMC policies will be posted on the AMC website.
- F. Changes to AMC policies will normally be published in the AMC newsletter following the Board's action and become effective on the day of the next AMC member meeting, but the Board may set a different effective date when appropriate.
- G. Changes to the AMC policies will be placed among the Members Documents on the AMC website as soon as practical.
- H. All AMC policy changes will be emailed to the Board, Committee Chairs and Outing Leaders when posted to the AMC website.

This policy will be reflected on the website immediately by Erik sending the new Board policy document which incorporates this particular policy to Robert England for uploading.

New Business:

Marketing the AMC. Eric Evans discussed his research into how students of Outdoor Rock School made their decision to attend and what alternatives they considered. The Board considered a variety of viewpoints and issues. A questionnaire to members to understand better what they want from the AMC was discussed.

Gift Certificates for Climbing Competition. The Board approved donating two AMC memberships to Marty Karabin for the upcoming climbing competition on April 25.

First Aid. John Keedy will pursue a class for First Aid recertification for Outing Leaders.

Board meeting date. The Board decided not to change the typical meeting date of the Board being two weeks prior to the Member meeting.

Executive Session. The Board adjourned to an Executive Session.

President's Corner - Announcements/Congratulations

The president of the AMC wishes to congratulate Jodie Bostrom on earning the WFR certification from the WMI in March. The Wilderness First Responder (WFR) certification requires completion of a rigorous 80 hour curriculum of first responder medical training tailored to the backcountry setting and is recognized as the 'union card' in commercial guiding and outdoor recreation circles. The WFR curriculum is set by the Wilderness Medical Institute of the National Outdoor Leadership School and requires knowledge for multiple interventions for a variety of potential backcountry medical and trauma situations. Earning the WFR represents a significant commitment in terms of time, cost and effort. Congratulations Jodie and welcome to the AMC's small but growing community of WFRs, W.EMTs and WUMPs. The president of the AMC wishes to congratulate Wolfgang Rupp on earning the Level I Avalanche certification from the Silverton Avalanche School in the San Juan Mountains of Colorado. The Level I Avalanche certification meets the curriculum guidelines set by the American Avalanche Association including key skills in avalanche avoidance, snow pack evaluation, avalanche victim search and recovery, avalanche beacon usage, snow travel protocols and risk management for backcountry travelers. The Level I Avalanche certification represents a significant investment in time and cost and a sacrifice of time in the San Juan mountains that might have been spent climbing or backcountry skiing. 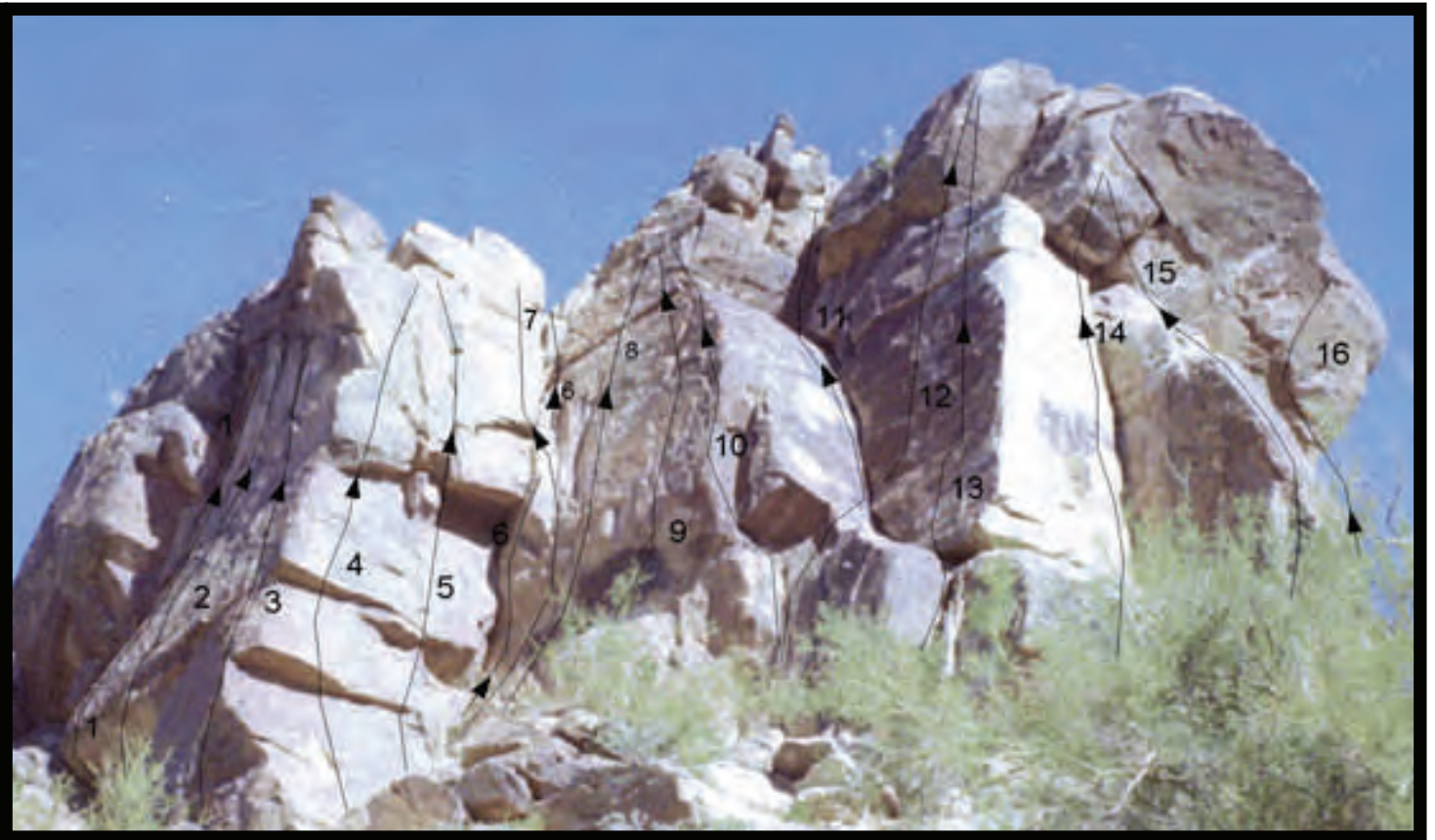

Teddy Bear Wall in South Mountain Park

Now that the spring schools are over, I know folks are just itchin' to get out and put their new skills to use. Teddy Bear Wall in South Mountain Park presents an ideal crag with an easy access and approach, and is a great destination for an after work or weekend morning adventure. The variety of climbs is amazing for such a compact area (5.0 and up - face, crack, arête, dihedral, and an overhang).



Anchor set up is a cinch. Access to the top is an easy walk-up on either side of the crag. There you'll find at least three bolts (scattered), plenty of solid boulders to sling, and plenty of places to use pro if you like. With a 60m rope, you can set up an M-belay on many of the adjacent climbs so that you can minimize resetting anchors.

Legend has it that the crag got its name after someone painted a large teddy bear on one of the faces. In the right light, if you look close enough, you can just about make out the image.

'Beta' - Defined

Ever wondered where the term 'beta' originated? I first heard it used in the context of providing generally useful information about a climb (holds, difficulty, style (trad or sport), the crux, gear requirements etc) and accepted that it was just climber slang, not really giving it another thought ... until lately ... when I find it no longer adequate to give the explanation that it's just a climber term.

According to Wikipedia and other sources, the term 'beta' originated with a popular climber by the name of Jack Mileski. Jack was prominent in the 1980s and early 1990s in the Shawangunks, Austin, Texas, and Colorado Springs. He is credited with at least popularizing the term 'beta', if not actually originating it. As a play on words (in which 'beta' was short for the then-popular videotape format "Betamax") Jack could often be heard asking fellow climbers: "You want the 'beta' Max?"

Unfortunately Jack is no longer with us, as he was murdered in his sleep by an ex girlfriend.

Proper climbing etiquette (now I wonder about that phrase) suggests that one should not dispense 'beta' unless it is requested, lest it distract the climber.

Additional qualifications for the use of 'beta':

- An 'onsight' climb is considered to be such only if the climber has not previously climbed the route, and has received no 'beta' about the climb
- If a climber has received 'beta' about a route that they have not previously climbed, their ascent of the route is considered to be a 'flash' climb

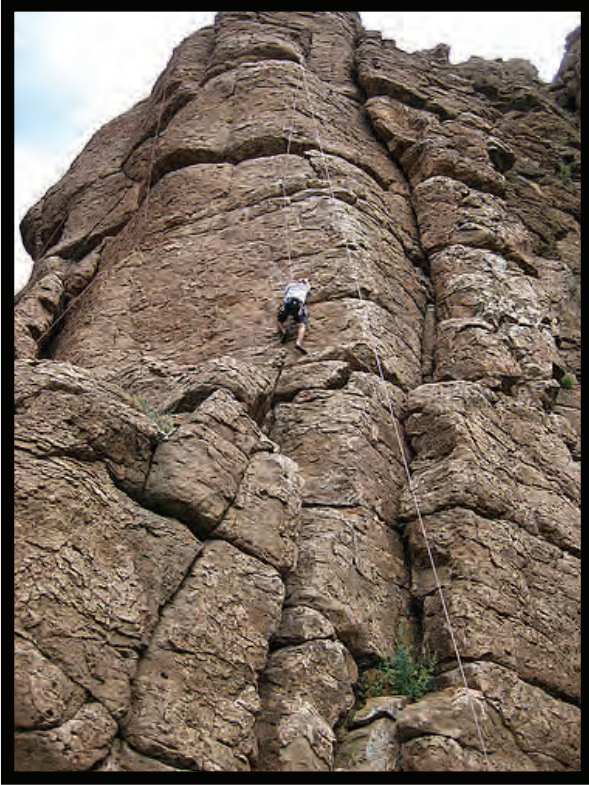

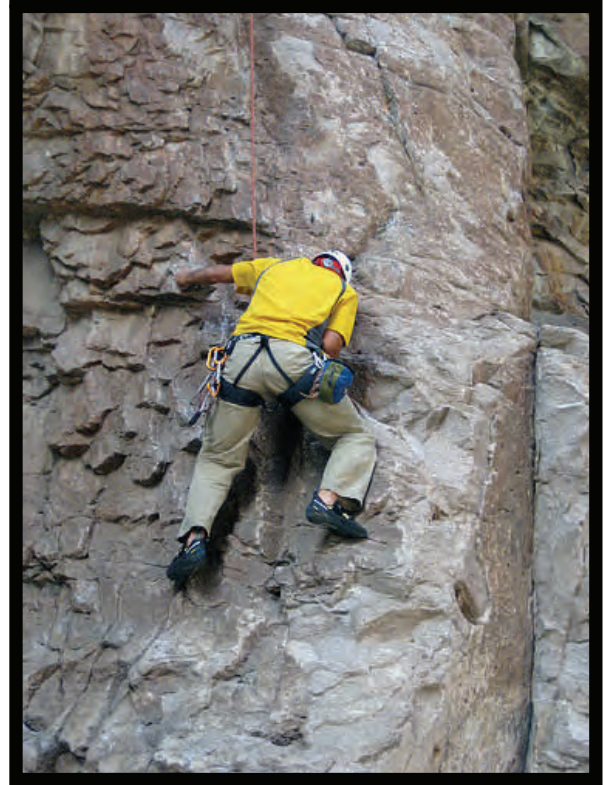

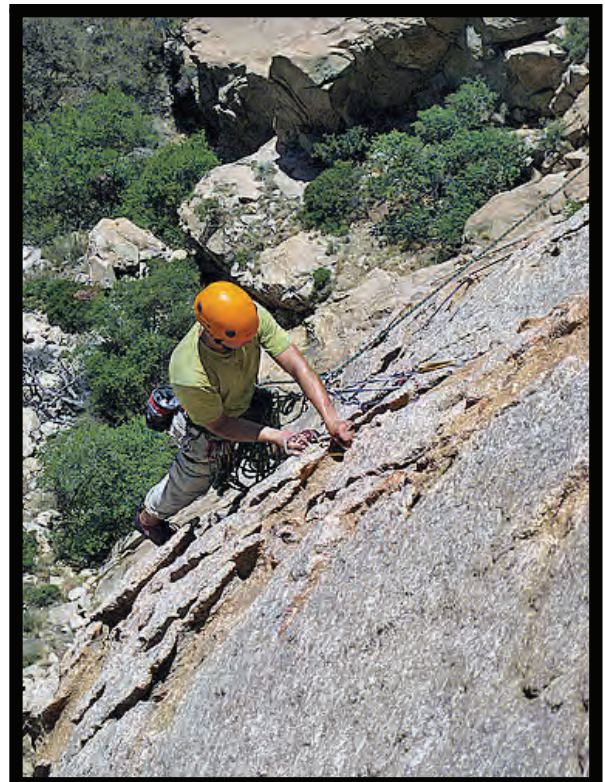

Become an AMC Outing Leader

General requirements for becoming an AMC outing leader:

- Be a member for at least one year
- Take the Basic, Anchors and Lead classes (or equivalents)
- Complete a basic first aid and CPR class (8 hours or more)
- Submit an application to the Classification Chairperson
- Apprentice on at least three outings with approved outing leaders
- Get recommendation from at least five current outing leaders (including those from apprentice outings)
- Be approved by the Board of Directors.
