

Pasta Slab – Little Granite Mountain

With the purchase of the former State Trust Land around Little Granite Mountain and the placement of a new parking lot access at 136th Street and the Power Line Road, it is possible to start sharing some of the neat climbing areas that have been saved in that area. New trails have been/are being constructed so it is not possible to give you a City approved climbing access route map yet, but you can start checking out some of these great areas with the materials provided.


Most climbers who have been to Little Granite Mountain will have to become re-educated to access. Almost all of the old trail heads, access points and access trails are now gone. New official city trail heads and trails are being constructed and Pasta Slab is probably the closest in rock climbing area on Little Granite Mountain (save for the Den which lies about 10 minutes or .5 miles west along the Power Line). It sits underneath the rock crag called Pasta Pinnacle and has some great easy 5th class climbs making it an excellent place to take beginners and families.



The accompanying locator map with GPS will assist you in navigating to the crag. In general, head west along the Power Line dirt road until you arrive at a diagonal trail just past some boulders that connects the Power Line road with the new Little Granite Mountain Loop trail. Please note that there are new official city trails that leave from the Trail Head at 136th Street and the Power Line but they are "scenic" (read long and circumlocutious). Hiking the way shown herein will take about 45 minutes to reach the crag whereas following the trails from the parking lot may take over an hour.

Once on the Little Granite Mountain Loop trail, continue heading west for less than 5 minutes until you are directly underneath Pasta Slab. A cairned climber's path leads up through the brush to the crag.

The following climbs can be lead or top-roped. A "walk-up" to the top involves following the diagonal ledge system under the climbs from left to right and scrambling up and around the right side of the crag. Two rap anchors serve as good raps at the end of the climbing day.



As depicted on the route photo, the routes are:

1. Half Measures -30 meters -5.4. Follow a crack on the left side of the formation and up over a small roof to a bolt. Climb up past horizontal cracks (large gear would be needed to protect them -5" to 6"). Climb past another bolt and then follow a water streak up and right to a cold shut anchor.

2. Full Measures -30 meters -5.4. Starting on a short slab just right of the prior route, climb up over the small roof, past a bolt, to some horizontal cracks (large gear), and past another bolt to a horizontal crack (2") and to the cold shut anchor.

3. Problem Dog - 30 meters -5.3. Prominent curving crack with multiple gear placements to cold shut anchor.

4. Negro Y Azul -20 meters -5.6. Starting further right past a chimney feature follow a steeper slab up past two bolts and over a roof, tending right to a cold shut anchor.

5. Blue Sky - 20 meters -5.7. Ten feet right of the previous climb follow up a slippery slab with water stain past a bolt to a roof. Gear placement with longer runner under roof. Make move over roof and to cold shut anchor.

6. Crazy Handful of Nothin - 5.5. Follow the right facing corner to top of small slab feature and work left up through 4 foot high roof and then trend left to cold shut anchor.

7. Say My Name – 5.6. Climb face right of previous route to apex and through roof to cold shut anchor.

The aforementioned walk off is possible climber's right, or rappel from cold shut anchors. Single rack will work up to 4". If you want to further protect left hand climbs consider bringing something for a 5" crack.

Snowdon Peak and Eureka Ice Climbs in Summer

A Trip Report

On Memorial Day weekend Cheryl Beaver and I traveled to Southwest Colorado to explore our alpine interests. There is a new campground at Eureka, about 10 miles east of Silverton, where

historically I have stayed with AMC mountaineering groups. Later in the summer it is a fee site, but it was free during our stay. The campground has great views of the surrounding peaks and there was only one other party camping there.

Most of Saturday was taken in driving there and we were blocked by rushing water and ice from getting in to Whore House Hose, a marvelous 5-pitch winter ice climb, but it was good to stretch our legs before dinner of salad and Tortellini.

Sunday our first objective was Second Gully. Cheryl had a new pair of mountaineering boots and we wanted to test them out on alpine terrain.

We scrambled up right of the Second Gully waterfall to an area just above the end of the first ice pitch. We roped up when the climbing in mountaineering boots became challenging (see photo – Second Gully rock). Cheryl's boots worked great. I lead a couple of low 5th class rock pitches right of the running water in rock shoes and before long we emerged on top of the ice climb. For interest to those ice climbers, there are now bolted and chained anchors at the top of each of the ice climbing pitches.

The day was beautiful and warm and we ate lunch on the level area climber's right of the top of the ice. We descended skier's left down the descent gully, involving one rap off of bolts and chains and down the steepest and narrowest section. This drops you out by the bottom of Goldrush, which was running beautifully (see photo Goldrush).

Avalanche snow was still bridging the main stream

below the road in the bottom of the valley so we were able to cross easily to the south side and hike down and then up to the base of Stairway to Heaven. I had never rock climbed Stairway, so we put on our rock shoes and scrambled up the first two pitches of the winter ice climb on rock climber's left of the running water and some remaining ice.

Our descent involved that great snow couloir underneath Stairway (See photo Stairway to Heaven). Both it and the one west of it under Highway to Nowhere were in the great as always Memorial Day shape that had served me and the AMC well in the past for snow travel and ice ax arrest practice. (Note – for anyone wishing to practice alpine snow skills, remember that Snowbowl after the ski area closes and Eureka on Memorial Day always has good snow for snow skills practicing and AMC'ers planning summer trips should take advantage to hone their skills.)

After a nice pot roast meal back at camp and an early night, we woke up to the alarm at 3:30 a.m. AZ time for our alpine ascent of Snowdon Peak (13,077 ft). We drove up past Molas Pass and parked at Andrews Lake. Sunrise was just about ready to happen as we hiked up the Crater Lake trail to the flat marshy areas west of Snowdon. This also has been the location of a number of AMC outings and basecamps in the past and brought back fond memories of good times with good people. One Memorial Day I remembered John Keedy's perch as base camp manager communicating with the 5 teams of AMC'ers taking different ascent routes to the summit. Good times.

The accompanying route photo shows a number of lines I have had AMC'ers do over the years. I've personally had fun on the direct west rib line, the prominent snow couloir, and this repeat of the regular route on the north ridge.

Surprisingly there was a pretty good trail from the main trail most of the way to the saddle on Snowdon's north


Stnowdon - Routes

ridge. The downside was that most of the trail through the woods was snow covered and almost impossible to follow. Fortunately I had a pretty good recollection of where it was, so Cheryl and I stayed on track to the base of Snowdon and then followed the couloir left of the peak up to the saddle (See attached route photo of Snowdon Peak).

The summit ridge from the saddle is dramatic looking but very doable. We followed the ridgeline on rock and snow, some times dropping to the east side to pass obstacles. While the upper mountain can be climbed more or less directly (the route I did with James Perey and Valerie Bednar after we climbed the prominent northwest couloir route), this time we followed the standard ascent which bridges out onto the north face and winds up some couloirs involving 4th class rock scrambling (See attached route photo of North Ridge route).

Cheryl topped out on the summit ridge and was first to the broad summit, which is about as big as a football field. It had taken us about 5 hours from the parking lot at Andrews Lake to the summit, a time extended by my slow pace. It was about 9:30 AZ time, having started about 4:30 AZ time.

The summit views were 360 degrees of snow capped mountains. As folks probably know, the amcaz.org 12

whole SW area of Colorado is rich with 14,000 foot peaks as well as high 13'ers. The weather was perfect and warm. After some food, we descended back down the ascent route and made it back smoothly to the car by 12:30 AZ time.

Snowdon, along with its sister and brother peaks in the area, offers a super early season venue for those seeking to train their alpine legs and skills.
